PROGRAM NOTES

After nearly 15 years as a trombonist specializing in orchestral and solo performance, **Chris Branagan** has successfully transitioned into a career split between arts administration and conducting. Prior to joining the trombone section The U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own" in Washington, DC, he held positions with the San Antonio Symphony and Austin Lyric Opera Orchestra, as well as several regional orchestras in South Texas. For five years as a member of the Army Band's ceremonial component, he performed for presidents, kings, and queens in the nation's capital. Chris also maintained an active freelancing schedule, performing regularly with the National Philharmonic, Baltimore Opera Orchestra and Washington National Opera at the Kennedy Center.

Chris earned a Bachelor's degree in performance from Texas Tech University where he studied with Robert Deahl and Don Lucas. He earned a Master of Music degree from the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama, studying with Lance Green, principal trombone of the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, and the acclaimed international soloist John Kenny. While a student at the RSAMD, he won every solo and chamber music prize available to brass musicians, including a solo performance with the BBC Scottish Symphony and an apprenticeship with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra. Chris has been a prizewinner in solo competitions of the ITA and IWBC and was selected as a participant in the 2001 Alessi Seminar.

An active educator and clinician, he has held two university teaching positions, and has given master classes in trombone performance at Boston University, the University of Texas-Austin, the University of Georgia and the Manhattan School of Music

Chris is expanding his resume as a conductor, having made his Kennedy Center conducting debut in 2009 with a contemporary music ensemble made up of colleagues from "Pershing's Own." He currently serves as music director of the Washington Trombone Ensemble, and has led the 20-piece trombone choir in numerous performances around Washington, DC, and also in the ensemble's debut recording: The Road Not Taken, available on Summit Records. In July 2012, he was selected to conduct The U.S. Army Concert Band in a special performance on the steps of the U.S. Capitol.
