#### National Solo Competition | Bass Trombone

Each year the Eastern Trombone Workshop hosts its National Solo Competition. This event gives students and young professional trombonists the opportunity to compete against others in their age category from all over the country. Recordings are sent to ETW for review in January. From these recordings, up to three participants are chosen for each of the six divisions to perform in the final round in a recital open to the public. A distinguished panel of judges chooses a winner for each division. The experience gained through making a quality audition recording and learning how to perform in a competitive environment is invaluable for musicians of any age or performance level. The large and ever-growing number of recordings received is evidence that the National Solo Competition continues to be one of ETW's most exciting and anticipated events. This year the competition moves to a single open final round, with bass trombones and tenor trombones on separate days.



Joseph Alessi, tenor trombone





Joseph Alessi was appointed Principal Trombone of the New York Philharmonic in the spring of 1985. Prior to joining the Philharmonic, Mr. Alessi was second trombone of The Philadelphia Orchestra for four seasons, and principal trombone of L'Orchestre Symphonique de Montreal for one season. In April 1990 he made his solo debut with the New York Philharmonic, performing Creston's Fantasy for Trombone, and in 1992 premiered Christopher Rouse's Pulitzer Prize-winning Trombone Concerto with the Philharmonic. His most recent appearance with the Philharmonic as soloist was in world premiere performances of Melinda Wagner's Trombone Concerto in February of 2007. In 2002 Mr. Alessi was awarded the International Trombone Association Award for his contributions to the world of trombone music and trombone playing. Mr. Alessi is currently on the faculty of The Juilliard School; his students now occupy posts with many major symphony orchestras both internationally and across the United States.

MAJ Paul Bamonte, a native of Washington, DC, serves as Associate Conductor of The U.S. Army Band "Pershing's Own" and Director of The U.S. Army Strings, both located in the Nation's Capital. MAJ Bamonte holds a Bachelor of Music degree in flute performance from Shenandoah Conservatory of Music in Winchester, Virginia. He also studied orchestral and opera conducting at Florida State University, Tallahassee, Florida. While at FSU, he served as Assistant Conductor for the Florida State University Symphony Orchestra and Opera.

David Begnoche is Assistant Professor of Trombone at Texas Christian University School of Music in Fort Worth and a founding member of acclaimed trombone quartet, Stentorian Consort. A recipient of the Priddy Fellowship in Arts Leadership and a strong advocate for American music, Mr. Begnoche commissioned noted composer and former New England Conservatory classmate James Stephenson to write this chamber piece for trombone, percussion and piano, the instrumentation representing Begnoche's chosen instrument, and those of his wife and his brother, both professional musicians themselves. Mr. Begnoche is joined in this performance by pianist Elvia Puccinelli, Associate Professor of Collaborative Piano and Vocal Coaching at the University of North Texas College of Music, and percussionist Jeffrey Hodge, Adjunct Instructor of Percussion at Texas Christian University.

#### **PERFORMERS**

**DAN BARRET1**University of Maine

Dan Barrett teaches trombone, music theory, and chamber music at the University of Maine. He also leads the Maine Trombone Collective, a large group of professional and student trombonists that performs throughout the state. His career has included performances with the Utah Symphony, the Bangor Symphony, the Boston Brass, and many other ensembles, as well as solo performances with the Carson City Symphony, the University of Maine Symphonic Band, the BYU Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Utah Premiere Brass Band. Dan received a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Arizona State University where his doctoral research focused on the music of Daniel Schnyder. He has studied with Leonard Neidhold, Daniel Bachelder, Will Kimball, Rusty McKinney, Gail Wilson, and David Vining.

# THE CAPITOL BONES Washington, DC

In 1991 MSG Matt Niess pulled together a group of trombonists from Washington, DC, a region celebrated for its deep and diverse community of musicians. The result was the formation of The Capitol Bones. Nineteen years later the group has an international reputation and is described as being "innovative, progressive, and rich with tradition." In addition to being the flagship jazz trombone ensemble at the Eastern Trombone Workshop, The Capitol Bones have performed around the U.S. as featured artists/clinicians at the International Trombone Festival in Nevada, New York, Illinois, and Utah; The International Association of Jazz Educators Conference in California, and at many universities and conservatories throughout the nation. In his review of their CD Epistrophy for Jazz Times, Harvey Siders writes, "Solo highlights abound, but the section is the most memorable instrument." The Capitol Bones perform, educate, and share a love of trombone, jazz, and music for the performer and the serious listener. In May they will perform at the first conference of newly formed Jazz Education Network in St. Louis with Tom "Bones" Malone. The Capitol Bones are sponsored by Antoine Courtois Trombones.

# CHICAGO TROMBONE CONSORT

The Chicago Trombone Consort is thrilled to be a part of the 2010 ETW and to announce its debut CD release, available at this week's workshop. Founded and directed by Lyric Opera of Chicago trombonist Mark Fisher, the CTC's membership includes some of the finest orchestral trombonists, university teachers and low brass soloists in the country. CTC performances this week include a full ensemble performance at 5:45pm on Friday afternoon and a Thursday evening performance of Derek Bourgeois's Concerto for Three Trombones, Strings, and Percussion featuring CTC members Peter Ellefson, Mark Fisher and David Becker.

**CURTIS FULLER**Legendary Jazz Musician



Serving in an Army band with Cannonball Adderley helped Curtis Fuller mature into a professional. After the Army, he became a founding member of The Jazztet with Benny Golson and Art Farmer, then joined Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers. Working in a front line with Wayne Shorter and Freddie Hubbard, Fuller helped make this edition of the Messengers one of the defining bands of the hard-bop era. Fuller toured Europe with Dizzy Gillespie's big band. Later, he experimented playing hard bop arrangements featuring electronic instruments, heading a group with Bill Washer and Stanley Clarke. Fuller toured with the Count Basie Band; co-led the quintet Giant Bones with Kai Winding; and played with Art Blakey, Cedar Walton, and Benny Golson. In more recent years, Fuller has become known nationally and internationally as a master clinician in jazz studies programs. He holds an honorary doctorate from Berklee College of Music.

CRISTIAN GANICENCO

Cristian Ganicenco has earned acclaim both as an international soloist and as Principal Trombonist with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, where he was appointed in the Fall of 1999. Mr. Ganicenco graduated from the prestigious Academy of Music in Bucharest prior to winning the audition with the Romanian National Radio Orchestra. In 1994, Mr. Ganicenco continued his studies in the United States with Byron McCulloh at Carnegie Mellon University. During this time, Mr. Ganicenco also studied with Joseph Alessi. In October 2003, Mr. Ganicenco made his critically acclaimed solo debut with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra performing Creston's Fantasy for Trombone and Orchestra. Mr. Ganicenco's recent solo CD album Beyond Oblivion received criti-

cal acclaim in the American Record Guide. Mr. Ganicenco

performs exclusively on Edwards trombones.

A native of South Carolina, Lt. Colonel John Clanton received his undergraduate music degree from Furman University and his Master of Music degree in Conducting from the Eastman School of Music, where he studied with Donald Hunsberger and conducted the Eastman Wind Ensemble. He conducts regularly at the White House and at state functions honoring visiting heads of state and the nation's most senior political and military leaders. Lt. Col. Clanton organized and conducted the Armed Forces Chorus which performed at the official state funeral ceremonies at Washington National Cathedral for former Presidents Ronald Reagan in 2004 and Gerald R. Ford in 2007. Lt. Col. Clanton performed and recorded for four seasons with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus under Maestro Robert Shaw. He attended the Tanglewood Music Festival, Robert Shaw Choral Institute, and was selected to participate in the 2005 and 2006 National Conductors Institute at the Kennedy Center where he studied with Maestro Leonard Slatkin and the National Symphony Orchestra (NSO).

Jimmy Clark is the assistant professor of trombone at Texas A&M University-Commerce. His undergraduate degree is from the University of North Texas. He did graduate work at Yale University and received his master's degree from East Texas State University. He is principal trombone of the Dallas Opera Orchestra and the Dallas Wind Symphony. He performs with the Dallas Symphony, Sante Fe Opera, Singapore Symphony, Fort Worth Symphony, and the San Antonio Symphony. In 1996 he was selected as a member of the University of North Texas One O'clock All-Star Alumni Band. His wife Lou Ann is a high school librarian and their son, Chris, is a member of the trombone section of the President's Own United States Marine Band.

Peter Ellefson performs frequently with the Chicago Symphony and the New York Philharmonic. He has performed with the Canadian Brass, Proteus 7, Chicago Chamber Musicians, Music of the Baroque, and the New York Philharmonic Brass Quintet. A member of the Seattle Symphony for ten years, Peter performed and recorded on alto and tenor trombone, bass trumpet and tenor tuba, and served as the principal trombonist for Seattle Opera's numerous productions of Wagner's *Der Ring des Nibelungen*. In addition to holding the rank of Professor of Music at Indiana University, Mr. Ellefson teaches at Northwestern University, Roosevelt University, and The Alessi Seminar. He has also taught at the University of Costa Rica and The Music Academy of the West.

Mark Fisher is trombonist with the Chicago Lyric Opera Orchestra, principal with the Sante Fe Opera, a member of the Asbury Brass Quintet, and substitutes with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Also a brilliant euphonium player, he has won the Senior Division Solo competition of the International TUBA Conference and performed as euphonium soloist with the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra under the direction of Pinchas Zukerman. Mr. Fisher's principal teachers have been Fritz Kaenzig and John Swallow.

His Majestys Sagbutts and Cornetts is a group of virtuoso wind players who specialize in playing Renaissance and Baroque music in historically appropriate styles on original instruments. The group's illustrious sounding name is taken from Matthew Locke's "five-part tthings [sic] for His Majestys Sagbutts and Cornetts" that were probably played during the coronation celebrations for King Charles II in 1661. Essentially a recital group comprising two cornets, three sackbutts, and chamber organ, HMS&C often joins with singers and string players, and is frequently asked to take part in projects with choirs: John Eliot Gardiner's Monteverdi Choir; the BBC Singers; and the choirs of Trinity and King's College, Cambridge; as well as those of Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's, and Westminster Cathedrals, London.
